
SUBJECT: ENGLISH LITERATURE

For example, what does the poet mean when he uses the metaphor "blood-sweeten'd beverage" in Sonnet III? How important do you think poetry was in the 18th and 19th centuries in providing information for people about things that bat inbuman trader life were happening thousands of miles away from pangling scourge. Identify some facts about Robert Southey blood-sweeten'd beverage which might explain why he was interested in the orn: I thank they slave trade - for example, where did he come from, and why could this be important?
